One of the most frequently asked questions of me as a pastoral carer is, 'Why?' Why is John suffering such debilitating pain in hospital? Why has Mary died so young when she has left behind two children and an unemployed husband? Why is Brother David, now at the age of 93, suffering from advanced dementia, when he was such an active and vibrant member of our ecclesia? Why has Sister Amanda had another miscarriage? Why does little Billy, at the age of 4, have cancer?

My usual, immediate answer is "I don't know". I have no idea why these 'events' take place in an individual's life. I have some Scriptural reasons why, in general, these events take place but, at a time when such questions are often asked, it is not usually appropriate to launch into a theological explanation. And, very rarely does the person asking the question expect a definitive and immediate answer. I usually further respond that "I am so sorry that this is happening. Can I help you in some way - perhaps by praying with you that you and your loved one might be comforted by the loving hand of our Lord?" This will often provide an opportunity for the caring person to express their feelings which can, in itself, help them through their concern for their loved one.

Simple care

A Sunday morning is often the only time some members (and children and young people) in our ecclesias have an opportunity to meet with other people of our faith during a week. How do we help them? Our help can be very simple – do we say "Hello!"? We can initiate this. Simple? Yes. Do we do it? Not always. We all know it is just not possible for us to have an extended conversation before or after our Sunday meetings. But a warm, sincere greeting to everyone we see, and including those we do not always see each Sunday, can make a real difference to the brotherly and sisterly contact each week. It shows we care and that we can make an effort to pay them some attention. After all, are we not wanting to spend eternity with them? We can be so insensitive sometimes when we walk straight past someone without a glance, or seem too busy to engage in conversation. How many people have we hurt by not acknowledging that this was the first meeting they had attended after a major illness?
