
Report: Youth Challenges

Section A – Summary of responses of Christadelphians prepared by ChatGPT

Introduction



This report summarises the results of a survey conducted with 28 participants about the challenges facing young people today. The responses reveal a wide spectrum of spiritual, social, emotional, and practical struggles, alongside strategies for overcoming them, the role of faith, and the support youth seek from older generations.

A1 Demographics

- Gender split: 50% male, 50% female.
- Age range: Respondents ranged from 16 years to 87 years, representing perspectives from both youth and older generations observing youth issues.

A2 Challenges Young People Face

A2.1 Social and Peer Pressures

- Peer pressure related to alcohol, drugs, sexual activity, and “fitting in.”
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- Difficulty expressing faith openly without attracting unwanted attention or ridicule.
 - Bullying and exclusion from non-believers.

A2.2 Identity and Belonging

- Anxiety about not fitting in with friends, family, or church communities.
- Struggles with gender and sexual identity messages promoted online.
- Youth self-diagnosing mental health conditions (ADHD, autism) due to social media influence.
- Feelings of isolation and difficulty forming meaningful relationships.

A2.3 Mental Health and Emotional Struggles

- Social anxiety, hopelessness, and despair (“what’s the point?”)
- Constant exposure to global crises through media, leading to fear and discouragement.
- Addictive use of phones, screens, and entertainment leading to distraction.
- Comparison with others through social media, creating self-doubt.

A2.4 Cultural and Moral Issues

- Declining societal values: drugs, casual sex, and rejection of traditional marriage.
- Conflicts around same-sex marriage and morality.
- Concerns about “woke” ideologies, climate politics, and secular worldviews that exclude God.
- Lack of respect for biblical knowledge in the younger generation.
- Many dilemmas in prioritising the commandments of Christ when there appears to be conflict.

A2.5 Practical and Financial Pressures

- Heavy school workload and pressure to succeed academically.
- Concerns about career prospects, job security, and purpose.
- Financial stress, especially around housing affordability and cost of living.
- Pressure from families/church around baptism, dress codes, appearance, and finding a life partner within the ecclesia.



A3 Ways Youth Overcome Challenges

- Faith-based strategies: Relying on prayer, Bible study, and biblical role models (e.g., Daniel, Esther, Joseph, Jesus).
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- Healthy practices: Exercise, nature, hobbies, outdoor activities, reducing screen time.
 - Communication: Talking problems through with trusted people, counsellors, or peers.
 - Withdrawal/avoidance: Some youth cope by blending in, withdrawing from conflict, or avoiding certain groups.
 - Practical involvement in voluntary activities for the benefit of others “with no strings attached”.

A4 Role of Jesus and God in Meeting Challenges

- Acceptance and Identity: Trusting God’s acceptance is more important than human opinions.
- Strength and Comfort: Prayer, scripture, and the Holy Spirit provide resilience.
- Hope and Guidance: Faith offers confidence in an uncertain future.
- Examples from Scripture: Learning from biblical figures who faced adversity faithfully.
- Community of Faith: Belonging to youth groups and ecclesias strengthens resolve.

A5 Support from Older Generations

Youth expressed a strong desire for more understanding, listening, and inclusion from older believers:

- Listen without judgement: Many want older people to listen compassionately rather than criticise.
- Encouragement, not control: Allow youth to serve and lead without micromanagement.
- Role models: Demonstrate genuine Christian living and share personal faith stories.
- Connection and conversation: Initiate interactions, show interest, and create safe spaces for discussion.
- Acceptance: Welcome youth as they are, even if they have different perspectives or struggles.
- Mentorship: Be present, available, and consistent in offering guidance and care.

Some youth noted that in their ecclesias, older members already provide mentorship and encouragement — which they find invaluable.

A6 Conclusion

This survey highlights the multi-layered challenges young people face today:

- Pressure from peers, media, and culture.
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- Struggles with identity, faith, and belonging.
- Anxiety, hopelessness, and distraction from technology.
- Financial and practical burdens.

Despite these struggles, youth find strength through:

- Faith in God and Jesus (prayer, scripture, spiritual hope).
- Supportive communities (family, friends, youth groups).
- Practical coping strategies (exercise, communication, limiting media use).

Older generations have a vital role to play by listening, guiding, encouraging, and modelling Christlike living. Youth long for intergenerational connection, mentorship, and acceptance as they navigate the pressures of modern life.

- Christian youth groups and mentorship programs can provide alternative sources of influence.
- Teach resilience and discernment using the armor of God (Ephesians 6:10–18).

B3. Mental Health and Anxiety

The Challenge:

Today's youth face unprecedented levels of anxiety, depression, and loneliness due to academic pressures, social media, broken homes, and a lack of spiritual grounding.

Christian Perspective:

The Bible acknowledges human struggle but offers hope, peace, and comfort through God.

Grace and Truth:

- The Church must uphold Biblical truth **while extending grace** and compassion to those struggling.
 - Focus on teaching **God's design for love, commitment, and respect**, not just rules.
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- Emphasise repentance and the power of transformation through Christ (2 Corinthians 5:17).

B5. Substance Abuse and Addiction

The Challenge:
